

#### **Visit to Avalon Marshes in July**

Avalon Archaeology is a lovingly crafted reproduction of Somerset's heritage in the heart of the Avalon Marshes. It has been hand built by a dedicated group of volunteers using traditional techniques.

With our guide we explored an Iron Age roundhouse under construction, a richly decorated reconstructed Roman dining-room, an Anglo-Saxon longhall, Filled with handcrafted furniture and art, as well as a waterline replica of a Viking ship. Thousands of years of heritage and we noted the detective work behind its recreation.

Luckily we had a fine day and the tour was enjoyed by a group of 11 and one of the features of the visit was going into the world's oldest excavation hut and watch short films on local archaeology in the Bulleid and Gray Cinema. The centre is much improved with a lovely coffee and snack area along with a traditional craft shop.
