...AND A NIGHT IN WITH A MYSTERY GIRL AT THE MUSEUM



SAD NEWS FOR STATION HERITAGE CENTRE



Just four months after our highly-successful visit to the Sandford and Banwell railway station heritage centre comes the sad news that their chairman, Neville Brenchley, has died after a long illness. He was 86. Many Friends were able to chat with him while others toured the station and its valuable collection. This is how the trust announced his passing: "On top of the past two tragic years of losses at the Centre, we have more sad news, our Chairman, Neville Brenchley, passed away earlier this month [October]. Neville was our first and only chairman to date. He was involved in setting up the Heritage Centre and its successful management until last year when he fell ill. He was a competent leader with a ready wit, was well liked and will be truly missed by all, including regulars from the Retirement Village. It is now a case of rebuilding the team." Neville and his wife Lois have been driving forces in the development of both the Cheddar Valley railway walk, the station trust and Winscombe's Millenium Green. The station heritage trust is seeking volunteers to help in the future. His funeral was held at the beginning of November.
