

First Event

The first meeting of the Friends of King John's Hunting Lodge took place on Wednesday March 15th and was a great success with the talk being given by Steve Tofts on the subject of *'Lead mining on Mendip. What the Romans did for us.'* Liz Scott and John Page welcomed everyone and talked about the new organisation and its hopes for the future. While IT issues were being resolved, an interesting discussion ensued and somehow touched on the unlikely subject of the perceived gender of witches and warlocks and the variety of apotropaic symbols found in old buildings.

With IT issues resolved, Steve was able to draw on many years of research by himself and other members of CHERT* to show how lead has been exploited over possibly more than 5000 years. One of the highlights from a talk packed with information was the analysis of the lead content found in stalactites which found fluctuations in the balance of Uranium to Thorium. These indicated that there were peaks of mining activity not just in the Roman period but prior to that in the Bronze and Iron Ages and after that in the late Medieval and Victorian Periods.

It seems likely that Rome was trading with the area prior to its invasion in 43 AD. The Romans prized not only the lead but also the silver content of the lead ore and Steve speculated that the wealth generated from the silver content could even have funded the invasion. Mendip lead, identified by its chemical signature, has been found widely and has even been identified at Pompeii where it has been found under the volcanic ash erupted by Vesuvius in 79 AD.

Steve showed us a fascinating photograph of the site that had been taken by Harold St George Gray in 1931. The position of the Roman amphitheatre, the extent of the Roman town and part of a Roman Road were all clearly visible.

Steve also described how later in the Victorian Period improved techniques had made the reprocessing of slag possible. He described how the Pattinson Process enabled both lead and silver to be extracted more efficiently than had previously been possible. But that these activities had led to riots in Cheddar in 1838 where the water was found to have become heavily polluted.

Steve's talk was well received, led to an interesting discussion and also the request that a visit to the site be organised.
